Unpacking

- 4410 mAh Lithium-ion battery
- Micro USB cable
- Lanyard
- Quick Start Guide
- · Regulatory Guide.




Figure 1-1 Features - Left and Right Side Views




Figure 1-2 Features - Front and Back Views

Setting Up the RFD8500

To start using the RFD8500 for the first time:

- Install the battery.
- Charge the RFD8500.
- Power on the RFD8500.
- Pair the RFD8500 over Bluetooth with a mobile device.
- Install the appropriate applications: Zebra RFID Mobile, Zebra Scanner Control, or the partner application (Android or iOS).
- Set the region and power level (using the Zebra RFID Mobile application, Zebra Scanner Control application, or the partner application).

Installing the Battery

To install the battery:

- 1. Depress both battery cover release buttons.
- 2. Slide back, and remove battery cover.




Figure 1-3 Removing the Battery Cover

3. Align the three tabs on the bottom of the battery (*Figure 1-5*) with the three slots in the battery compartment.




Figure 1-4 Inserting the Battery

4. Press the battery down and rotate until it locks into place.




Figure 1-5 Inserting the Battery

5. Replace the battery cover by placing the cover over the battery and sliding it forward until it clicks in place.




Figure 1-6 Replacing the Battery Cover

6. Press the **Power** button to turn on the RFD8500.

Removing the Battery

To remove the battery:

- 1. If powered on, press the **Power** button to power off the RFD8500.
- 2. Remove the battery cover as shown in Figure 1-3 on page 1-4.
- 3. With two fingers, press the battery down.




Figure 1-7 Removing the Battery

4. Rotate the battery out of the compartment.




Figure 1-8 Removing the Battery

- 5. Replace the battery cover as shown in *Figure 1-6 on page 1-6*.
- **6.** Press the **Power** button to power on the device.

Mounting a Mobile Device on the RFD8500

To mount a mobile device:

- Remove the battery cover as shown in Figure 1-3 on page 1-4.
- 2. Remove the plastic tip from the RFD8500 battery cover.





Figure 1-10 Mounting the Device

- Mount the mobile device into its case. (Cases vary depending on the mobile device.)
- **4.** Attach the mobile computer case to the RFD8500 battery cover.
- 5. Slide the battery cover onto the RFD8500 until it locks in place.
- **6.** The battery cover latches secure the mobile computer to the RFD8500.

Installing the Lanyard

To install the optional lanyard:

- 1. Insert the loop on the lanyard into the slot at the bottom of the RFD8500 handle.
- **2.** Thread the upper portion of the lanyard into the loop.
- 3. Pull the clip through the loop over the tether point and tighten into place.




Figure 1-11 Installing the Lanyard

Charging

Charging the Battery in the Reader



CAUTION Ensure that you follow the guidelines for battery safety described in *Battery Management on page*

Before using the RFD8500 for the first time, charge the battery until the LED Power/Charging Indicator turns solid green (see *LED and Beeper Indicators on page 2-2* for charge status indications). To charge the RFD8500, use the Micro USB cable, cup charger, or cradle.




Figure 1-12 Charging Accessories

The Three Slot Charge Only cradle can be used to charge any combination of devices including the RFD8500, TC55, and a dual battery charger.




Figure 1-13 Charging Devices

Charging the Mobile Device Battery

Follow the instructions in the mobile device User Guide for charging the battery in the mobile device.

Charging Temperature

Charge batteries in temperatures from 0° C to 40° C (32° F to 104° F). The RFD8500 indicates when charging is disabled due to abnormal temperatures via its power LED.



NOTE For safety reasons, ensure that the battery cover is properly installed.

When the battery is properly installed, the reader powers on and the power LED turns solid green.

Battery Management

Prior to checking the battery charge level, remove the RFD8500 from any AC power source (cradle or cable). To check the charge status of the main battery, the RFD8500 should be connected to the mobile computer over Bluetooth. When connected, run the appropriate Zebra RFID Mobile application and select *Settings > Battery Status*.

Battery status indicates that the battery is discharging and the battery level indicates the battery charge (as a percentage of fully charged). If using the partner application. Refer to the partner application documentation.

Low Battery Notification

When the reader has 20% battery remaining, the power LED becomes solid amber. No beeps sound.

When the battery State of Charge (SOC) is equal or less than 10%, the power LED is solid red and short beep sounds repeat ONLY when the device is NOT connected to a charger AND when the unit is active (not in low power mode, or off mode).

When the reader has 5% battery remaining, the reader sounds high, medium, low beeps before automatically powering off.

Battery Optimization

The RFD8500 supports intelligent performance and battery optimizations for your application needs. An API is available to enable this setting. Refer to the *RFD8500 RFID Developer Guide* (p/n MN002222AXX) for more information.

Downloading Application Software

Zebra RFID Mobile Application for Android

Requirements

- The recommended Android version on the mobile computer is Kit Kat version 4.4.x.
- Recommended Zebra Enterprise mobile computers: MC40, TC55, and TC70.

Installing the Software

Install the Zebra RFID Mobile application for Android (or partner application) on the mobile computer from the Zebra website. The procedure to install the software in an Android device depends on the Android version.

To install the software:

- 1. Connect the Android device to your computer. It should be connected as *MTP Device* and should show as a drive on your computer.
- 2. Go to *Device Settings* > *Security* and check *Unknown Sources* to allow installation of applications from unknown sources.
- 3. Copy the .apk file to the mobile device.
- **4.** Go to Settings > Security and select Unknown sources.
- 5. Use File Manager to locate the .apk file in the folder to which you copied it in Step 5., and select it.
- **6.** In the pop-up window, select the *Android App* installer.
- 7. The installation begins.
- 8. Before using the application, pair the Android device using the Android *BT Settings* (see *Pairing on page 2-5*). Paring is initiated by the Android device.

Zebra RFID Mobile Application for iOS

Requirements

- iOS version is 8.0 or later is recommended.
- Recommended devices: iPod touch 5, iPhone 5, and iPhone 6.

Installing the Software

To install the software download the Zebra RFID Mobile application from Apple App Store.

Before using the application, pair the iOS device using iOS *BT Settings* (see *Pairing on page 2-5*). Paring is initiated by the iOS device.

Bluetooth® Wireless Technology Connections

Bluetooth-equipped devices can communicate without wires, using frequency-hopping spread spectrum (FHSS) radio frequency (RF) to transmit and receive data in the 2.4 GHz Industry Scientific and Medical (ISM) band (802.15.1). Bluetooth wireless technology is specifically designed for short-range (10 meters/32.8 feet) communication and low power consumption.

Devices with Bluetooth capabilities can exchange information (e.g., files, appointments, and tasks) with other Bluetooth enabled devices such as printers, access points, and other mobile devices.

The RFD8500 can be paired with the following Android and Apple devices.

 - iPod touch 5.

Adaptive Frequency Hopping (AFH) is a method of avoiding fixed frequency interference, and can be used with Bluetooth voice. All devices in the piconet (Bluetooth network) must be AFH-capable in order for AFH to work. There is no AFH when connecting and discovering devices. Avoid making Bluetooth connections and discoveries during critical 802.11b communications. AFH for Bluetooth consists of four main sections:

- Channel Classification A method of detecting an interference on a channel-by-channel basis, or pre-defined channel mask.
- Link Management Coordinates and distributes the AFH information to the rest of the Bluetooth network.
- Hop Sequence Modification Avoids interference by selectively reducing the number of hopping channels.
- Channel Maintenance A method for periodically re-evaluating the channels.

When AFH is enabled, the Bluetooth radio "hops around" (instead of through) the 802.11b high-rate channels. AFH coexistence allows Enterprise devices to operate in any infrastructure.

The Bluetooth radio in this device operates as a Class 2 device power class. The maximum output power is 2.5 mW and the expected range is 10 meters (32.8 ft.). A definition of ranges based on power class is difficult to obtain due to power and device differences, and whether one measures open space or closed office space.



NOTE It is not recommended to perform Bluetooth wireless technology inquiry when high rate 802.11b operation is required.

Security

The current Bluetooth specification defines security at the link level. Application-level security is also available via a ZETI interface password. This allows application developers to define security mechanisms tailored to their specific need. Link-level security occurs between devices, not users, while application-level security can be enabled globally. The Bluetooth specification defines security algorithms and procedures required to authenticate devices, and if needed, encrypt the data flowing on the link between the devices. Device authentication is a mandatory feature of Bluetooth while link encryption is optional. The RFD8500 Bluetooth interface uses authentication and security by default, and is compatible with devices supporting Bluetooth v2.1 and later.

RFD8500 uses the 'just works' methods defined under the Secure Simple Pairing (SSP) framework. Thus, no personal identification number (PIN) is required to pair.

Recommendations are:

- Perform pairing in a secure environment
- Implement application-level security.

The RFD8500 supports the following Bluetooth services:

Bluetooth v2.1 devices and later.

Pairing

Pairing with the RFD8500 is completed from the Android or iOS Platform via Bluetooth *Settings* on the mobile device.

Prior to pairing the RFD8500 with another device ensure the RFD8500 is charged.



IMPORTANT For successful pairing of the RFD8500 to an Android or iOS Device, the yellow trigger on RFD8500 must be pressed when the RFD8500 displays in the list of available discoverable devices, and the RFD8500 Bluetooth LED starts flashing fast. See the step-by-step instructions for pairing.

Conventional Bluetooth Pairing Method

Pairing with an Android Device

To pair with an Android device such as the TC55:

- 1. Power on the TC55.
- 2. Touch the Settings icon on the mobile device.
- 3. Turn Bluetooth on.
- 4. Touch Search for Devices to display the available discoverable devices.
- 5. Turn the RFD8500 on and ensure Bluetooth is enabled. If not, press the **Bluetooth** button on the RFD8500 for one second to make it discoverable. When discoverable, the Bluetooth LED flashes blue.



NOTE The RFD8500 is discoverable over Bluetooth for 40 seconds after start up. After that time Bluetooth suspends and is no longer discoverable. To restart discovery, press the **Bluetooth** button for one second.

6. When the RFD8500 displays in the list of available discoverable devices, tap the RFD8500 device in the list **and press the RFD8500 trigger** to pair when the Bluetooth LED starts flashing fast. A beep sounds when pairing completes successfully.



NOTE Ensure you choose the correct RFD8500 serial number from the list of discoverable devices.

- 7. Exit the *Device Settings* screen and run the application.
- **8.** From the application, select *Settings > Readers List* and confirm that the RFD8500 serial number you paired with is displayed. Select it in the list of Available Readers. This connects the RFD8500 to the mobile device.



NOTE Refer to the TC55 User Guide, p/n MN000015AXX, for detailed information about the device.

Pairing with an iOS Device

To pair with an iOS device:

- 1. Power on the iOS device.
- 2. Touch the Settings icon on the device.
- 3. Touch Bluetooth to display the Bluetooth Settings screen and ensure it is on.
- 4. Turn the RFD8500 on and ensure Bluetooth is enabled. If not, press the Bluetooth button on the RFD8500 for one second to make it discoverable. When discoverable, the Bluetooth LED flashes blue.



NOTE The RFD8500 is discoverable over Bluetooth for 40 seconds after start up. After that time Bluetooth suspends and is no longer discoverable. To restart discovery, press the **Bluetooth** button for one second.

5. When the RFD8500 displays in the list of available discoverable devices, tap the RFD8500 device in the list <u>and press the RFD8500 trigger</u> to pair when the Bluetooth LED starts flashing fast. A beep sounds when pairing completes successfully.



NOTE Ensure you choose the correct RFD8500 serial number from the list of discoverable devices.

- 6. Exit the Device Settings screen and run the application.
- 7. From the application, select Settings > Readers List and confirm that the RFD8500 serial number you paired with is displayed. Select it in the list of Available Readers. This connects the RFD8500 to the mobile device.



NOTE Refer to the iOS *User Guide* for detailed information about the device.

Pairing with a Windows Mobile Device

To pair with a Windows 10 mobile device:

- 1. Power on the Windows 10 device.
- 2. Touch the **Settings** icon on the device.
- 3. Touch the **Devices** icon in settings.
- 4. Touch the **Bluetooth** icon in Devices.
- Turn Bluetooth on.
- **6.** The phone/PC automatically searches and displays the available discoverable devices on the **Bluetooth** screen.
- 7. Turn the RFD8500 on and ensure Bluetooth is enabled. If not, press the **Bluetooth** button on the RFD8500 for one second to make it discoverable. When discoverable, the Bluetooth LED flashes blue.
- 8. When the RFD8500 displays in the list of available discoverable devices, tap the RFD8500 device in the list and <u>press the RFD8500 trigger</u> to pair when the Bluetooth LED starts flashing fast. A beep sounds when pairing completes successfully.
- 9. Exit the **Device Settings** screen and run the application.

10. From the application, select **Settings** > **Readers List** and confirm that the RFD8500 serial number you paired with is displayed. Select it in the list of Available Readers. This connects the RFD8500 to the mobile device.



IMPORTANT For successful pairing of the RFD8500 to an Android, iOS device or Windows 10, the yellow trigger on the RFD8500 must be pressed when the RFD8500 displays in the list of available discoverable devices, and the RFD8500 Bluetooth LED starts flashing fast. See the step-by-step instructions for pairing.



NOTE The RFD8500 is discoverable over Bluetooth for 40 seconds after start up. After that time Bluetooth suspends and is no longer discoverable. To restart discovery, press the Bluetooth button for one second.

Ensure you choose the correct RFD8500 serial number from the list of discoverable devices.

Using the Locate Device Bar Code

The Locate Device bar code appears on the RFD8500 under the antenna compartment. When you pair several RFD8500 devices with your mobile device via Bluetooth, use the serial number represented by the Locate Device bar code to identify a specific paired RFD8500. The bar code can also be used for pairing. Refer to the RFD8500 RFID Developer Guide (p/n MN002222AXX) for details.

Reading Tags

To read tags, see the Zebra RFID Mobile App information in *Chapter 3, ZEBRA RFID MOBILE APPLICATION* for ANDROID and *Chapter 4, ZEBRA RFID MOBILE APPLICATION* for iOS.




Figure 2-1 Reading Tags




Figure 2-2 Scanning Bar Codes

Transferring Data

Transferring Data in Batch Mode

When the RFD8500 is configured to batch data it is capable of scanning bar codes and reading RFID tag data without a Bluetooth connection in place. It is recommended to stop scanning and reading functions before transferring the data via the Bluetooth interface. The **Delay before data transmission in Batch Mode** parameter in the 123Scan RFD8500 plug-in controls whether or not a delay should be enforced before transferring the data in HID mode. By default, this parameter is zero. RFID data is not transferred automatically in ZETI mode. Instead it has be requested by the application using the *gettags* ZETI command. For more information, refer to the Zebra RFID Mobile App for Android or iOS source code and the developer guides.

Transferring Data via Bluetooth

By default, the RFD8500 operates in auto Batch Mode. In this mode the RFD8500 pushes bar code, or RFID data after a scan or read request is issued by the connected application. If the Bluetooth link quality degrades and breaks, the RFD8500 (in auto Batch Mode) is capable of moving automatically to Batch Mode while simultaneously allowing current scanning, or RFID operations to be unaffected. If the Bluetooth connection is regained after the RFD8500 entered Batch Mode, see *Transferring Data in Batch Mode* above to offload the data acquired while the unit was operating in Batch Mode.

Transferring Data via USB

By default, the RFD8500 is not configured to transfer data via the USB port. 123Scan can be used to configure USB Communication Device Class (CDC) or USB Human Interface Device class (HID) modes.

- USB CDC mode supports RFID data via the ZETI protocol.
- USB HID mode supports both RFID and bar code.

Use the Cable connection page in 123Scan to choose between two options.




Figure 2-3 123Scan USB Connection Screen

2 - 10 RFD8500 User Guide

USB SNAPI mode is the default USB configuration and it is used primarily to manage the RFD8500 (configuration and firmware updates).

The USB CDC mode requires the Zebra CDC driver for Windows which can be obtained from the Barcode Scanner SDK Driver Utilities site at:

Chapter 3 ZEBRA RFID MOBILE APPLICATION for ANDROID

Introduction

This chapter describes the Zebra RFID Mobile Application for Android that can be used with the RFD8500.

There are five applications:

- Zebra RFID Mobile Application for Android
- Zebra RFID Mobile Application for iOS
- Zebra RFID Mobile Application for Windows
- Zebra Scanner Control Application for iOS
- Zebra Scanner Control Application for Android.

When using a partner application, the features/functionality might vary.

Zebra RFID Mobile Application for Android

This application runs on Android mobile devices and demonstrates RFD8500 capability and tag operation functionality.

The application allows the user to navigate to all screens whether or not the device is connected to the RFD8500 reader. The Settings screens display the application defaults when there is no connection to the reader. When not connected, an attempt to perform any operation (Rapid Read, Inventory, Locate tag, Access Operations, Save Configuration, Battery Status) displays No Active Connection with Reader.

The user can navigate to all screens when the inventory/locate operation is in progress. When the operation is in progress, the device displays *Operation in Progress* if additional operations are initiated.

Using the Zebra RFID Mobile Application for Android

To use this application for RFID operations:

- 1. Ensure the Zebra RFID Mobile Application for Android is installed on the Android mobile device.
- 2. Ensure the RFD8500 is in RFID mode.

- 3. Pair the mobile device with the RFD8500 over Bluetooth (see Pairing on page 2-5).
- 4. Launch the Zebra RFID Mobile Application for Android on the mobile device.
- 5. Select Settings > Readers List and select the RFD8500 device to connect.
- **6.** Return to the *Home* screen and select *Settings > Antenna. Power Level* is set to 27.0 dBm by default. Japan units are set to a different default power level depending on the SKU type.
- 7. Before using the device set the region in which the device is operating. To set the region, open the application and select *Settings* > *Regulatory* (see *Regulatory on page 3-24*).

Home Screen

To access the Zebra RFID Mobile Application for Android, touch the RFID Reader icon () on the mobile device to display the Home screen. Touch the RFID Reader icon again to display the RFID Reader Menu. Touch any menu item to access its screen.






Figure 3-1 Home and Menu Screens

Rapid Read

Touch Rapid Read from the Home or Menu screen.




Figure 3-2 Rapid Read Screen

The Rapid Read and Inventory screens display the following data (see Inventory on page 3-4).

- Total tag count
- Read time (mm:ss)
- Tag read rate (tags/sec)
- Unique tag count (displays in the center of screen).

Rapid Read and Inventory screens are two different views of the inventory operation on the reader. The start/stop functionality can be used interchangeably on both screens. For example, when the user starts the operation on the Rapid Read screen and navigates to the Inventory screen, the button available on the Inventory screen is **STOP**. The same is true when the operation starts on the Inventory screen. During the rapid read process the user can navigate to the Inventory screen to view tag details along with tag counts for each tag. The statistics displayed are maintained on the Rapid Read and Inventory screens regardless of the screen used to start the process.

Touch **START** to start the rapid read inventory operation. Touch **STOP** to stop.



NOTE The scan trigger on the RFD8500 can also start and stop the inventory operation. The reader must be in RFID mode. Press the trigger to start, and press again to stop.

Moving to another screen does not halt the operation. However, attempting to make changes or perform another operation while rapid read is in process results in an error.

Inventory

Touch Inventory from the Home or Menu screen.




Figure 3-3 Inventory Screen

Tag reading can be started and stopped on this screen as well as on the *Rapid Read* screen (see *Rapid Read* on page 3-3). When the process starts, tag information displays on the screen.

Touch **START** to start the rapid read inventory operation. The button changes to **STOP**. Touch it to stop the read inventory operation.



NOTE The scan trigger on the RFD8500 can also start and stop the inventory operation. The reader must be in RFID mode. Press the trigger to start, and press again to stop.

The tag ID selected displays on the *Locate Tag* screen when navigating to that screen (see *Locate Tag on page 3-16*).

Tag List Match Mode Operation

When **Tag List Match Mode** is checked on the **Application** screen (*Application on page 3-19*), the application identifies tags from a given set of tags in csv tag list format (comma separated values file). The contents of the cvs file displays on the **Inventory** screen.




Figure 3-4 Tag List Menu

Before the inventory starts, the count is zero. *Figure 3-4* displays drop-down menu choices. Select an option to display the type of tags to show when the inventory starts.




Figure 3-7 Missed Taglist.cvs File Contents







Figure 3-8 Unknown Tags

The *Application* screen on *page 3-19* has the option to Export Data. If the option is checked, data is exported when the inventory stops. The tag content area is exportable to a file. For example, when **Matching** is selected from the menu to display only matching tags in the tag content area, the matching data can be exported to a file. The exported csv file includes the matching, missing, and unknown tag count shown in *Figure 3-10*.




Figure 3-11 Tag List Enabled; Batch Mode Enabled on Tag Reporting Screen

Unique Tag Reporting

• When the **Matching** option is selected (see Sample 1 Inventory List: Tag List Enabled; Auto Batch Mode or Disable Batch Mode; Matching Tag Option Selected on page 3-8) the tag count cannot be greater than one because the unique tags are only reported one time.




Figure 3-12 Unique Tag Report - Matching Tags




Figure 3-13 Unique Tag Report - No Matching Tags

Touch Locate Tag from the Home or Menu screen.




Figure 3-14 Locate Tag Screen

Touch **START** to start the locate tag operation. Touch **STOP** to stop. The RFD8500 trigger can also be used to start and stop the operation.



NOTE The scan trigger on the RFD8500 can also start and stop the inventory operation. The reader must be in RFID mode. Press the trigger to start, and press again to stop.

The color bar on the display shows the relative distance of the tag.

When the locate tag operation starts, moving to another screen does not stop the operation until Stop is pressed.




Figure 3-15 Settings Screen




Figure 3-17 Settings - Application Screen

The application always detects readers that were paired over Bluetooth.

- Auto Reconnect Reader: When checked, the application attempts to reconnect to the reader if the connection is lost within the session.
- By default the Reader Battery Status notification is enabled.
- Export Data: When checked, the application writes the inventoried RFID data to a file when the inventory operation stops. On Android platforms the file is saved in a fixed directory. The user can check files in file browsing in the Inventory directory (Sdcard/inventory/<files>), and these files can be copied to a PC.
- Tag List Match Mode: When checked, this operation identifies tags from a given set of tags in csv tag list format (comma separated values file). The Taglist.csv file must be located inside the rfid folder which must be manually created at the Android device root directory.



NOTE The folder name must be all lower case (i.e., rfid and not RFID).




Figure 3-18 Settings - Antenna




Figure 3-19 Settings - Singulation Control




Figure 3-20 Settings - Start/Stop Triggers




Figure 3-21 Settings - Tag Reporting




Figure 3-22 Settings - Regulatory




Figure 3-25 Settings - Beeper




Figure 3-26 Settings - Save Configuration




Figure 3-27 Access Control Screens - Read/Write; Lock; Kill




Figure 3-28 Pre Filters Screen




Figure 3-29 About Screen

Introduction

This chapter describes the Zebra RFID Mobile Application for iOS that can be used with the RFD8500.

There are five applications:

- Zebra RFID Mobile Application for Android
- Zebra RFID Mobile Application for iOS
- Zebra RFID Mobile Application for Windows
- Zebra Scanner Control Application for iOS
- Zebra Scanner Control Application for Android.

When using a partner application, the features/functionality might vary.

Using the Zebra RFID Mobile Application for iOS

This application runs on iOS mobile devices and demonstrates RFD8500 capability and tag operation functionality.

The application allows the user to navigate to all screens (except to some screens within the *Settings* page), whether or not the device is connected to the RFD8500 reader.

The Settings screens display the application defaults when there is no connection to the reader. When not connected, an attempt to perform any operation (Rapid Read, Inventory, Locate tag, Access Operations, Save Configuration, Battery Status) displays No Active Connection with Reader.

To use this application for RFID operations:

- 1. Ensure the Zebra RFID Mobile Application for iOS is installed on the iOS mobile device.
- 2. Ensure the RFD8500 is in RFID mode.
- 3. Pair the mobile device with the RFD8500 over Bluetooth (see *Pairing on page 2-5*).
- **4.** Launch the *Zebra RFID Mobile Application for iOS* on the mobile device.

- 5. Select Settings > Readers List and select the RFD8500 device to connect.
- **6.** Return to the *Home* screen and select *Settings > Antenna. Power Level* is set to 27.0 dBm by default. Japan units are set to a different default power level depending on the SKU type.
- 7. Before using the device set the region in which the device is operating. To set the region, open the application and select *Settings* > *Regulatory* (see *Regulatory on page 4-15*).

Pairing with an iOS Device

See *Pairing with an iOS Device on page 2-6* for the pairing process. The iOS process is similar to the Android pairing process.

After the application deploys, tap the **About** button to display the *About* screen. The *About* screen displays version information.

Pairing using S/N Bar Code

The RFD8500 can be paired with a host that can scan the bar code printed at the bottom of the RFD8500 antenna.

An Android demo application, sample code, and a white paper (see *Related Documents on page x*) describing this Bluetooth pairing process can be obtained by sending a request to Zebra support.

The procedure generally entails the following, in this order:

- 1. Run the Android demo application.
- 2. Press the RFD8500 **Bluetooth** button to start Bluetooth discovery mode.
- 3. Scan the RFD8500 S/N bar code at the bottom of the RFD8500 antenna.
- **4.** Press the RFD8500 trigger to complete the pairing process.

Home Screen




Figure 4-2 Home Screen




Figure 4-3 Rapid Read Screen






Figure 4-4 Inventory Screen




Figure 4-6 Settings Screen






Figure 4-12 Settings - Tag Reporting Screens




Figure 4-14 Settings - Battery Screen




Figure 4-16 Settings - Beeper Screen




Figure 4-17 Settings - Save Configuration Screens




Figure 4-19 Access Control Screens - Read/Write; Lock; Kill Screens




Figure 4-20 Pre Filters Screen




Figure 4-21 About Screen

- 6. Return to the *Home* screen and select *Settings > Antenna. Power Level* is set to 27.0 dBm by default. Japan units are set to a different default power level depending on the SKU type.
- 7. Before using the device set the region in which the device is operating. To set the region, open the application and select *Settings* > *Regulatory* (see *Regulatory on page 5-14*).

Home Screen

To access the Zebra RFID Mobile Application for Windows, touch the application icon () on the mobile device to display the Home screen. Touch any icon to access its screen.




Figure 5-1 Home Screen




Figure 5-2 Rapid Read Screen

The Rapid Read and Inventory screens display the following data (see Inventory on page 5-4).

- Dynamic Power Optimization (DPO) status When enabled, battery life is enhanced when performing inventory operations.
- Total tag count
- Read time (mm:ss)
- Tag read rate (tags/sec)
- Unique tag count (displays in the center of screen).

Rapid Read and Inventory screens are two different views of the inventory operation on the reader. The start/stop functionality can be used interchangeably on both screens. For example, when the user starts the operation on the Rapid Read screen and navigates to the Inventory screen, the button available on the Inventory screen is **STOP**. The same is true when the operation starts on the Inventory screen. During the rapid read process the user can navigate to the Inventory screen to view tag details along with tag counts for each tag. The statistics displayed are maintained on the Rapid Read and Inventory screens regardless of the screen used to start the process.

Touch **START** to start the rapid read inventory operation. Touch **STOP** to stop.



NOTE The scan trigger on the RFD8500 can also start and stop the inventory operation. The reader must be in RFID mode. Press the trigger to start, and press again to stop.

Moving to another screen does not halt the operation. However, attempting to make changes or perform another operation while rapid read is in process results in an error.

Inventory

Touch Inventory from the Home screen or Quick Navigation Bar.




Figure 5-3 Inventory Screen

Tag reading can be started and stopped on this screen as well as on the **Rapid Read** screen (see *Rapid Read* on page 5-3). When the process starts, tag information displays on the screen.

Touch **START** to start the rapid read inventory operation. The button changes to **STOP**. Touch it to stop the read inventory operation.



NOTE The scan trigger on the RFD8500 can also start and stop the inventory operation. The reader must be in RFID mode. Press the trigger to start, and press again to stop.




Figure 5-4 Locate Tag Screen






Figure 5-6 Settings - Readers List Screen




Figure 5-7 Settings - Application Screen






Figure 5-8 Settings - Antenna Screen




Figure 5-10 Settings - Start/Stop Triggers Screen




Figure 5-11 Settings - Tag Reporting Screens




Figure 5-12 Settings - Regulatory and Regions Screens




Figure 5-13 Settings - Battery Screen




Figure 5-14 Settings - Power Management Screen




Figure 5-16 Settings - Save Configuration Screens






Figure 5-17 Access Control Screens - Read/Write; Lock; Kill Screens




Figure 5-18 Pre Filters Screen




Figure 5-19 Bluetooth Connection Status in Notification Area - Updated by the Application




Figure 5-20 About Screen




Figure 6-1 Home Screen




Figure 6-4 Select a Scanner






Figure 6-6 Active Scanner Screen




Figure 6-7 Active Scanner Screen - INFO, BARCODE, SETTINGS Tabs




Figure 6-8 Settings Screen




Figure 6-9 Scanner Configurations Screen






Figure 7-5 Active Scanner Screen - Info, Barcode, and Settings Views




Figure 7-6 Settings Screen

Chapter 8 123SCAN

Introduction

123Scan is an easy-to-use, PC-based software tool that enables the quick and easy setup of Zebra scanners, and the RFD8500 reader.

123Scan uses a wizard tool to guide users through a streamlined set up process. Once parameters are set, the values are saved to a configuration file that can be distributed via e-mail, electronically downloaded via a USB cable. 123Scan can generate multiple reports that can be easily re-branded using Microsoft Word or Access. Report options include programmed parameters, and asset tracking information.

Additionally, 123Scan can upgrade RFD8500 firmware, automatically check online to enable support for newly released products, and stage scanners simultaneously via USB hub(s).



NOTE After you load updated configurations to the RFD8500 device via 123Scan, you must reboot the RFD8500 device in order to complete the configuration process. The RFD8500 automatically reboots if 123Scan is closed after the configuration upload.

If the RFD8500 was paired with the PC or mobile device before a firmware update, it might be necessary to un-pair, then pair again.

Communication with 123Scan

To communicate with the 123Scan program which runs on a host computer running a Windows XP SP2, Windows 7, and Windows 8 operating system, use a USB cable to connect the device to the host computer.

123Scan Requirements

- Host computer with Windows.
- USB cable.
- RFD8500.
- Plug-ins:
 - Configuring RFD8500 models <u>without</u> a built-in imaging scan engine requires only the RFD8500 plug-in.
 - Configuring RFD8500 models <u>with</u> a built-in imaging scan engine requires two plug-ins to create two
 configuration files one configuration file for the RFD8500, and a second configuration file for the
 iPL3307 (imager scan engine).
 - The RFD8500 plug-in is capable of configuration/firmware updates for both RFD8500 models (with and without an imaging scan engine).



NOTE The RFD8500 plug-in does not support configuring/updating firmware for the iPL3307 (imaging scan engine).

 The iPL3307 plug-in is used for configuration/firmware updates for the integrated PL3307 imaging scan engine.

Troubleshooting



NOTE Always ensure the battery cover and battery are properly installed.

Imager comes on, but scanner does not decode the bar code.	Reader is not programmed for the correct bar code type.	Ensure the scanner is programmed to read the type of bar code being scanned.

	Bar code is out of range of the scanner.	Move scanner closer to or further from bar code.

Reader does not fully charge.	Attempt to charge on a non-powered USB hub.	Connect the scanner to a powered USB power adapter (5V, 1.2A max).

100% of the active ingredients in any cleaner must consist of one or some combination of the following: isopropyl alcohol, bleach/sodium hypochlorite, hydrogen peroxide or mild dish soap.

Harmful Ingredients

The following chemicals are known to damage the plastics on the RFD8500 and mobile computers and should not come in contact with the device: ammonia solutions, compounds of amines or

ammonia; acetone; ketones; ethers; aromatic and chlorinated hydrocarbons; acqueous or alcoholic alkaline solutions; ethanolamine; toluene; trichloroethylene; benzene; carbolic acid and TB-lysoform.

Cleaning Instructions

Do not apply liquid directly to the RFD8500 and mobile computers. Dampen a soft cloth or use pre-moistened wipes. Do not wrap the device in the cloth or wipe, but gently wipe the unit. Be careful not to let liquid pool around the display window or other places. Allow the unit to air dry before use.



IMPORTANT Do not clean the device or expose it to rain or moisture when the battery cover is removed. Without the battery cover, the device is not water/dust sealed.

Special Cleaning Notes

Many vinyl gloves contain phthalate additives, which are often not recommended for medical use and are known to be harmful to the housing of the RFD8500 and mobile computers. The RFD8500 should not be handled while wearing vinyl gloves containing phthalates, or before hands are washed to remove contaminant residue after gloves are removed. If products containing any of the harmful ingredients listed above are used prior to handling the RFD8500, such as hand sanitizer that contain ethanolamine, hands must be completely dry before handling the RFD8500 to prevent damage to the plastics.

Materials Required

- · Alcohol wipes
- · Lens tissue
- · Cotton tipped applicators
- · Isopropyl alcohol
- · Can of compressed air with a tube.

Cleaning Charge Connectors

To clean the connectors on a cradle:

- 1. Remove the DC power cable from the cradle.
- 2. Dip the cotton portion of the cotton tipped applicator in isopropyl alcohol.
- Rub the cotton portion of the cotton tipped applicator along the pins of the connector. Slowly move the applicator back-and-forth from one side of the connector to the other. Do not let any cotton residue on the connector.
- 4. All sides of the connector should also be rubbed with the cotton tipped applicator.
- 5. Spray compressed air in the connector area by pointing the tube/nozzle about ½ inch away from the surface.



CAUTION Do not point nozzle at yourself and others, ensure the nozzle or tube is pointed away from your face.

- 6. Ensure that there is no lint left by the cotton tipped applicator, remove lint if found.
- If grease and other dirt can be found on other areas of the cradle, use lint free cloth and alcohol to remove.
- **8.** Allow at least 10 to 30 minutes (depending on ambient temperature and humidity) for the alcohol to air dry before applying power to cradle.
 - If the temperature is low and humidity is high, longer drying time is required. Warm temperature and dry humidity requires less drying time.

Cleaning Frequency

The cleaning frequency is up to the customer's discretion due to the varied environments in which the mobile devices are used. They may be cleaned as frequently as required. However when used in dirty environments it may be advisable to periodically clean the scanner exit window to ensure optimum scanning performance.

Maintenance

For trouble-free service, observe the tips that follow when using the device.

RFD8500

- Although the device is water and dust resistant, do not expose it to rain or moisture for an extended period of time. In general, treat the device as a pocket calculator or other small electronic instrument.
- Do not clean the device or expose it to rain or moisture when the battery is removed. Without the battery, the device is not water/dust sealed.
- Do not drop the device or subject it to strong impact.
- Protect the device from temperature extremes. Do not leave it on the dashboard of a car on a hot day, and keep it away from heat sources.
- Do not store or use the device in any location that is extremely dusty, damp, or wet.
- Do not use window cleaning solution. Use a soft cloth dampened with a 50/50 solution of isopropyl alcohol and water. See *Cleaning on page A-2*.
- Do not allow the solution to form a pool of liquid anywhere on the screen or device.
- Do not use a large amount of solution to cause the device to remain wet.

Battery



WARNING! Do not store the device with the battery installed. Doing so long term may cause irreversible harm to the battery. Always store the battery removed from the device. If a battery is installed during long term storage, it may discharge to point at which it cannot be recovered.

Even when stored separately from device it is important to follow industry standard guidelines. When batteries are stored over a year, battery cell manufacturers advise that some irreversible deterioration in overall battery quality may occur. To minimize this loss, they recommend storing batteries half charged in a dry, cool place between 41° and 77°F (5° and 25°C), the cooler the better. Batteries should be charged to half capacity at least once a year. In order to charge a battery to half capacity, take a fully discharged battery and charge it for two hours. If an electrolyte leakage is observed, avoid any contact with the affected area and properly dispose of the battery.
